### Reminder

As spring arrives, it's important to remind our children about bear safety. Here are some simple tips to share with them:

**Make Noise:** Encourage your kids to make noise while playing outside.

Singing, clapping, or talking loudly can help avoid surprising bears.

**Keep Food Safe:** Teach children to put away their snacks and clean up after eating. Bears are attracted to food left out.

**Stay Together:** Remind kids to play in groups and stay close to adults. Bears are less likely to approach larger groups.

**Look for Signs:** Show children what bear tracks and scat look like. If they see signs of a bear, they should calmly leave the area and tell an adult.

**Give Bears Space:** If a bear is spotted, instruct kids to back away slowly, avoid eye contact, and speak softly.

By sharing these tips, we can help our children stay safe and enjoy the outdoors
