





If there were one thing I would recommend for reading to learn more about literacy and, specifically, reading comprehension, it is this article from Pearson and Duke, who are gurus in the Science(s) of Reading Research. Duke's Active View of Reading (Duke and Cartright 2021) is foundational to our elementary literacy framework. What's more, this article lays out the practical steps for classroom instruction and isn't obscured by academia or airy abstraction. Worth the read.
